





RUN TIME: 75 MINUTES WITHOUT AN INTERMISSION



The Return of Benjamin Lay originated in a conversation we had in Medford, Oregon, in 2015. Naomi had written her play The Liquid Plain based on a story in Marcus's book The Slave Ship: A Human History, for the Oregon Shakespeare Festival. While sitting outdoors at a café, we began to discuss the book Marcus was then writing, what became The Fearless Benjamin Lay: The Quaker Dwarf who became the First Revolutionary Abolitionist (2017). After a discussion of Lay's militant and theatrical protests against slavery, Naomi said, "We are going to write a play about him."

Two years later, after the book had been published, we were invited to give a plenary lecture at the Haus der Kulturen der Welt in Berlin on the theme, "What Comes after Nations?" We decided to end our talk by having an actor dressed as Benjamin Lay stride onto the stage to disrupt the proceedings by challenging the audience about their complicity with inequality and oppression. The conference curators liked the idea, so we wrote a ten-minute monologue, a first step toward a play. When we asked the curators to help us find a dwarf actor, they grew anxious. We found a little person actor on our own. The curators then "withdrew their support" for the Ben Lay part of our lecture. After conferring with little people/disability rights activists we concluded that their response was an act of prejudice and censorship and we resigned from the conference in protest. Marcus then flew to North Yorkshire, where Naomi lives, and we started writing the play in earnest. The play was originally "Banned in Berlin."

We decided to bring Benjamin back from the grave to speak to us today — to a world in flames because of climate change, diminished by the extinction of animal species, poisoned by the legacy of slavery, riven by the inequalities of racial capitalism, wracked by the hatred of the immigrant "other," and bloodied by the violence of colonial wars. Benjamin was deeply concerned about these very issues three hundred years ago.

Over the next five years we wrote and rewrote the play, meeting when we could, communicating across the Atlantic by every means available to us: Zoom, phone, email, text. We held readings of the play in London,

Paris, and New York, returning to the manuscript each time to make revisions and refinements. We found our director in Ron Daniels and our actor in Mark Povinelli. The play premiered at the Finborough Theatre in London in June and July 2023. From the very beginning of the project, we felt that world needed Benjamin Lay now more than ever. We have summoned him from the grave to give us the benefit of his hard-won wisdom.

A NOTE FROM FROM THE DIRECTOR

A Bruised Reed

He shall not break a bruised reed, nor quench the smoking flax, he shall bring forth judgment unto truth. (Isaiah 42:3)

The Return of Benjamin Lay is neither a documentary nor a biopic. A one-person event, yes, but it is an epic born of a wonderful, vast poetic imagination.

Naomi Wallace and Marcus Rediker's play, with its unexpected shifts of time and place, its unfinished sentences and surprising transitions, and above all its remarkable central character, is a hallucinatory exploration of the life of one of the earliest revolutionary abolitionists.

It is a daring piece of theater.

It sweeps across the centuries and sails the wide-open seas. It embodies the revolutionary ideas that flourished in England in the I650s and confronts the covetous slave-owning elders at a Quaker meeting in I738. Inspired by the character of Bussa, the legendary Igbo leader killed during the slave rebellion in Barbados in I816, Benjamin Lay returns from the grave in 2025, asking to be welcomed back into the community from which he has been excluded. A ferociously principled man. A driven, troubled man. A "bruised reed."

Where does the action of the play take place? Where are we now, at this very moment? In the silence of a Quaker meeting house in Burlington, New Jersey? Or in a transformed theater space in the beautiful Carnegie Library in Braddock, PA? And when is today? Today? Or in 1738? Indeed, who are we? More importantly, where does Benjamin, who at times is somewhat confused, think we are? Who does he think we are?

Benjamin Lay was, of course, right. Slavery has been abolished. And thanks in part to Marcus Rediker's book, *The Fearless Benjamin Lay*, the

Quaker community has now welcomed him back into the fold. There are now three rooms in his name in the Friends House on the Euston Road in London—the Benjamin Lay Suite!

Where, then, is the conflict that makes for good theater?

Desperately longing to be part of the Quaker community, yet fiercely holding to his own truths, refusing to compromise and "trembling at the edge of playing God himself," Benjamin Lay finds that in the end he has no choice but with a heavy heart to perform once again the "extravagant act" for which he was excluded from the community he so loved, 300 years ago. It is a frightening, prophetic act, an urgent warning of the approaching Apocalypse: "God will take vengeance against those who oppress their fellow creatures," as Naomi Wallace and Marcus Rediker have Benjamin say in the play.

Do we hear him, covered in blood, yet undefeated, as he is, now or 300 years ago?

And will we, in our world, and in our lives today, heed his warning?

Will we join him as he seeks to build a new Jerusalem and fulfill the biblical prophecy of the Jubilee: "Proclaim liberty throughout the land." (Leviticus 25:I)

A NOTE FROM FROM THE ACTOR

People are often curious how far an actor will go to embody a character. Method acting, creating a role by recreating the physical, mental and lived experiences of the character, is often seen as the true commitment of an actor.

Benjamin Lay was a sailor, a vegan, a radical, an anti-capitalist, a voracious reader, eschewed material goods, lived in a cave, and a devout man of God.

Well, at least I grew out the hair.

The truth is, there is no conceivable way in today's world to become Benjamin Lay. Fortunately, this play doesn't seek to recreate Benjamin. It's his soul that I am hoping to capture.

I have been an actor for thirty years and it is rare to come across a character so rich with dimension and complexity. Benjamin's conviction rivals the greatest of Shakespeare's kings. His faith would make Popes blush. His demons lurk like so many villains we write off as unbalanced.

The character Marcus Rediker and Naomi Wallace have created would be the envy of most any actor.

So naturally, when the legendary Ron Daniels approached me to play the role, my first instinct was a hard "no." Honestly, it terrified me. Not only was the role daunting, but the idea of performing a one-man show was beyond anything I had aspired to do. The fear and anxiety was real, and exactly why I had to say "yes." A wise director/playwright once said to me, "As artists we're lucky if we are a part of something truly meaningful once a decade." It was time. I didn't know if I'd be able to do Benjamin's story justice, but the opportunity to do work that had merit, depth and could compel audiences to think? Extraordinary.

As I've travelled on this journey bringing Benjamin back to life, he inhabits my brain and fills my conversations. I have realized though that when describing Benjamin, I often fail to mention one character trait... his dwarfism. Perhaps it's because that's where I innately understand the man. It can't be understated how my dwarfism has shaped the person I am. Dwarfism shaped Benjamin too, experientially and literally. Through this connection, this shared experience over centuries, I realized I could relate to him. I could embody this character. I could find his soul.

Enjoy the show.

BIOGRAPHIES



Karla Boos (Artistic Director) founded Quantum Theatre in 1990 and continues to enjoy exploring the language of theater in Pittsburgh. She often directs for the company (Chimerica) and sometimes performs (The Cherry Orchard). Quantum Theatre has produced many of her original texts, like Chatterton (adapted from Peter Ackroyd), All the Names (adapted from José Saramago), and her libretto for The

Winter's Tale, created as a Baroque pastiche opera. Quantum Theatre's work has been featured in national publications, frequently earns distinction in local publications, and has toured internationally. Boos has won awards locally, including the Carol R. Brown Award and the Pittsburgh Cultural Trust Creative Achievement Award. She is a member of the National Theatre Conference and the International Women's Forum and served as Guest Curator for the 2018 Pittsburgh International Festival of Firsts of the Pittsburgh Cultural Trust.



Ron Daniels (Director) After twenty years directing many productions for the Royal Shakespeare Company, Ron was named Honorary Associate Director of the RSC. He has directed many of the pillars of British theatre such as Ian McKellen, Patrick Stewart, Mark Rylance, Derek Jacobi, Glenda Jackson, Juliet Stevenson and Harriet Walter. Ron spent the last thirty years directing theatre and opera in

the U.S. and in his native Brazil, where he most recently directed his own adaptation of Albert Camus' *The Plague* with Thiago Lacerda, in São Paulo, Brazil. Back in the U.K. he directed the world premiere of Naomi Wallace and Marcus Rediker's *The Return of Benjamin Lay* and he curated the digital Shakespeare Portraits Collection which has been on exhibit at the Red Eight gallery in London.



Marcus Rediker (Playwright) is Distinguished Professor of Atlantic History at the University of Pittsburgh. His "histories from below," including The Slave Ship: A Human History, have won numerous awards, including the George Washington Book Prize, and have been translated into nineteen languages worldwide. He is the author of The Fearless Benjamin Lay: The Quaker Dwarf Who Became the First Revolutionary

Abolitionist, (Beacon Press, 2017), on which the play is based, and (with David Lester and Paul Buhle) of Prophet against Slavery: Benjamin Lay, A Graphic Novel (Beacon Press, 2021). He worked with Tony Buba to create the prize-winning documentary film, Ghosts of Amistad, and is now working with Tony on a new film about Benjamin Lay. Rediker's latest book, Freedom Ship: The Uncharted History of Escaping Slavery by Sea, will be published by Viking-Penguin in May 2025.



Naomi Wallace (*Playwright*) Naomi Wallace's plays have been produced in the United States, the U.K., Europe and the Middle East. Awards include the MacArthur Award, Obie Award, Susan Smith Blackburn Prize, Fellowship of Southern Writers Drama Award, Horton Foote Award, Arts and Letters Award in Literature, and the inaugural Windham Campbell prize for drama. Wallace is currently writing the book for the

John Mellencamp musical Small Town, and co-writing, with Greg Pierce, the book for the Loretta Lynn musical, Coal Miner's Daughter. Wallace is presently working on a new play with Ismail Khalidi for Ashtar theater in Ramallah, Guernica, Gaza: Visions From the Center of the Earth.

Mark Povinelli (Benjamin Lay) During his twenty-five year career, Mark has appeared in over 60 films and television shows, 25 theater productions and dozens of national commercials. His most notable films include Water For Elephants, Mirror Mirror, and Oscar nominated Nightmare Alley. Along with guest starring on such notable TV shows as Modern Family, Criminal Minds, Boardwalk Empire, Charmed and Frasier. Mark became the first little person cast as a series regular on a network

sitcom in Are You There, Chelsea? He's also widely known for his turn as The Cat in the Amazon limited series Mad Dogs. For nearly a decade, Mark toured the world as the critically praised 'Torvald Helmer' in the OBIE award winning production of Mabou Mines' Dollhouse. His other notable stage productions include the premiere of Belle Epoque at Lincoln Center in the lead role of Henri Toulouse-Lautrec; as well as performances at the Shakespeare Theater, Children's Theater Company, Oklahoma Lyric Theater, Will Geer Theatricum and UCLA Live. Most recently, Mark was nominated for an Off West End Award for his performance in the world premiere in London of Naomi Wallace and Marcus Redikers', The Return of Benjamin Lay. Mark is the past President of Little People of America, the world's largest organization that promotes awareness, advocacy and medical assistance for individuals with forms of dwarfism.



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

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


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
